The FAIRTRADE Mark means that farmers get paid a better price for the products they grow. Look for the label in your house. Can you find it on any clothes? How about food in the kitchen?	Check your drawers to see if there are any items of clothing that you do not need or fit anymore. Ask a grown up before you begin. Put these clothes in a bag to give to a family, friend or take to the charity shop. The clothes will be reused . It means that the clothes will be worn again!	Recycling your clothes means you can make them into something else! Use an old sock, t-shirt or pillow case to make a costume, new piece of clothing or toy.

AGES 7-11	It is important to take care of the clothes that we own. We wash our clothes to keep them clean. We fold clothes or hang them up in a wardrobe so they don't get crumpled. We pair socks so they don't get lost. Help a grown up next time they are doing the laundry. Learn how to fold a t-shirt, pair socks together and organise a clothes drawer.
