Solution to Testing for Covid in schools

I have a cunning plan to save money, keep schools open and reassure teachers and parents. Eton and Bennenden public schools have just bought Covid testing machines called a Samba 2 costing £35,000 each. Results in 90 minutes max and each test costs around £60. So there are currently 32,770 schools in the UK. Of these, 3,714 are nurseries or early-learning centres, 20,832 are primary schools, 19 are middle schools and 4,188 are secondary schools. There are 2,408 independent schools, 1,257 special schools and 352 pupil referral units (PRUs). If every school in the country was provided with one it amounts to £1,146,950,000 just over a billion. If they were put into the PM's beloved Rule of 6 say in a cluster of schools the cost falls to £191,158,333.333 etc. Staffing and training would be costly but a fraction of what we are currently spending. Its effect on people's mental health would be immeasurable. I was going to write it would be a 'game changer' but I have banned myself from using that overhyped phrase. Airports have them too.
