Apostrophes for omission

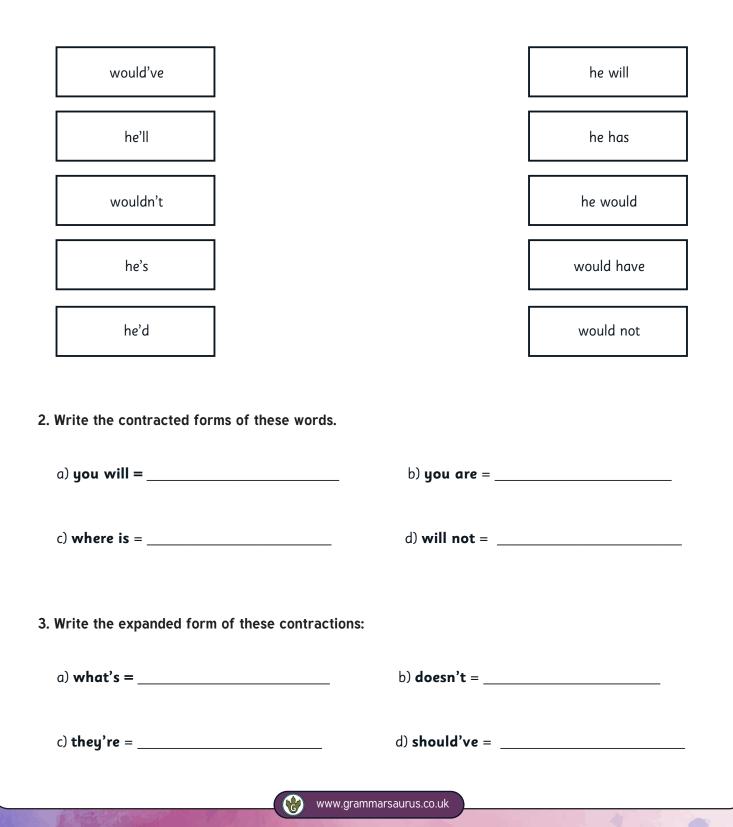
Apostrophes are a type of **punctuation**.

Apostrophes are used in informal language and are often used when people are speaking.

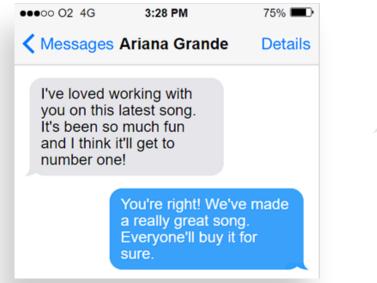


