

Who Does It Belong To?




Possession





Apostrophes to Show Possession

Sometimes using the words **belongs to** doesn't sound right.

For example if we were introducing someone we wouldn't say:

These are the parents that belong to Maddison.

What do you think we would say?

We would probably say:

These are Maddison's parents.



Apostrophes to Show Possession


These are Maddison's parents.

What do you notice about this sentence?
Look at the name Maddison.

This sentence contains an
apostrophe.

The apostrophe in this sentence tells us that
the parents belong to Maddison.

We need the apostrophe to make it clear to
our reader who it belongs to.



Apostrophes to Show Possession

When we say something belongs to someone, we add an 's' to the end of the word. However we also do this when the word becomes plural.

So we add an apostrophe before the 's' to show our reader we mean 'belongs to'.

one cat



The cat's bed



two cats



The dog's bed





Spot the Possessive Apostrophe



When we want to show that something belongs to someone, we use an apostrophe.

But we also use an apostrophe to show that there are letters missing in words.

Look at the two sentences below:

Gabriel's mum baked the delicious chocolate cake.

There wasn't much of it left when dad got home.

Hint – remember the apostrophe tells us who something or someone belongs to.

Spot the Possessive Apostrophe




'Good afternoon giants of Giant's Village. Welcome to the Great Celebration Carnival.'


'Help!' shouted one of the giants, 'I'm scared of frogs and I can't get away!'
